Pentecost Is New Creation

According to the Day of Pentecost story in Acts 2:1-13, God gave the gift of the Holy Spirit to empower witnesses to the resurrection. Sounds from heaven, cosmic language, the rush of a mighty "ruach" (wind, spirit, breath) invaded the house in which the apostles gathered, and appeared to them as a burning fire. Tongues of fire touched their nerve centers. A power — the unseen power of God — moved among them and gripped them. The Holy Spirit is unseen, like the wind, which is why the Old Testament calls it ruach YHWH, "the wind, or breath, of God" (cf. John 3:8). The Spirit is the "unseenness of God" working among us.

According to Joel (2:28-29) the ruach is to open everybody to God's future. People young and old will dream and will have visions of hope; they will be able to loose themselves from the way things are now, because God is establishing a whole new economy of creation. The Holy Spirit breaks us out of our preoccupation with ourselves and frees us to serve neighbors, loosens our grasp on possessions, and sets us to loving people. New creation is what Joel is talking about. Pentecost is new creation.

The book of Acts tells the story of the outcome of Pentecost's new creation: people witness in word and in deed to the risen Christ. At the outset, the newborn church immediately tumbled out into the streets to witness to God's mighty works in the languages of people all over the world. By the end of the story, a tiny, Spirit-filled community of faith that broke from its present order has spread across the continents with incredible power to bring new things into being. With the gift of the Spirit, all things are possible...

Therefore, on the Day of Pentecost, we celebrate God's gift of Holy Spirit which draws us together as one people, helps us to comprehend what God is doing in the world, and empowers us to proclaim, in word and in deed, God's plan of reconciling all people in the name of Christ (Ephesians 1:10).

Without the gift of the Spirit, Christ's church dries up and withers away, and we are left with only our broken selves. With the gift of the Spirit, all things are possible. A spirit-filled community of faith opens eyes to needs in the world and sees its missing as God's new people. The Day of Pentecost is the climax of the Great Fifty Days of Easter, celebrating as it does the gift of the Spirit to the body of Christ — the church.

SESSION NOTES FROM APRIL 9, 2018...

- 1. The meeting was opened by Elder Jean Snedegar with a devotional and prayer based on Luke 11.
- Larry Wing, Treasurer, gave a first-quarter report. The Session took the first of two actions to withdraw \$30,000 from the Angel Fund to use for current expenses. This has been a standard practice to supplement our deficit budget.
- 3. Jane Hazer reported for the Holy Trinity Lutheran Church. The partnership is going well. The offering from the Maundy Thursday communion service was donated to the Food Truck visit on June 2, 2018.
- 4. John Talbott reported dates of activities for Witness Service Committee:

*Easter Food Baskets on Palm Sunday

*Great Day of Service on April 28

- *The Food Truck on June 2 and September 22
- *Common Ground Café on July 28
- 5. Christian Education reported by Nate Garver-Daniels and Ginny Rast:
 - *A new printer has been purchased and placed upstairs for the use of the committee and Sunday School teachers
 - *May 20 will be the last day of Sunday School for children and youth for the Spring. *Plans for VBS are beginning.

*Plans for recognizing our High School and College graduates are ongoing.

- 6. The Stewardship Committee, chaired by Jean Snedegar, reported that the pledges for 2018 totaled \$164,812.
- 7. The Property Committee, chaired by Monica Varchetto, reported on the completion of repairs at Manse #2. The kitchen floor was repaired and new linoleum put down and the dishwasher was replaced after a frozen pipe gave way in January.
- 8. Rev. Vial will be taking May 5 and 6 as vacation days. Rev. Laura Brekke will be preaching and serving communion in his absence. Rev. Vial will be taking a continuing education day on April 17th.
- 9. The Presbytery of West Virginia will be meeting Thursday, May 17th in Charleston at the Village Chapel Presbyterian Church.
- 10. The next stated meeting of Session will be Monday, May 14th, 2018

THE FAMOUS HOT HAM-N-CHEESE SANDWICHES!



MAY FRIENDSHIP DAY...

FRIDAY, MAY 4, 2018 @ NOON

This will be held at the Woodford Memorial United Methodist Church located at 113 First St. We will have a short program before the luncheon.

During the meeting, the Women will be collecting the Least Coin offering. The Fellowship of the Least Coin has flourished as a global ecumenical women's prayer movement. The key to the movement's success is its simplicity. Individuals or groups may join by committing to pray for peace, justice, and reconciliation among families and communities and worldwide. Each time a woman prays, she sets aside the least coin of her local currency as a symbol of the prayer. Women's national groups collect the coins and send them to the Central FLC Fund, c/o World Council of Churches in Geneva, Switzerland. The prayers offered and the least coins collected support projects for women and children around the world.
