SESSION ACTIONS FROM THE AUGUST 12TH SESSION MEETING...

- 1. Sympathy was expressed to the family of Martha Cardot. Services were scheduled for August 31st.
- 2. Tina Vial was elected as commissioner to the August 24th meeting of the Presbytery of WV.
- 3. The first vote was taken on a capital gifts funds request by the Treasurer, Larry Wing, for \$30,000 from the Angel Fund to cover regular expenses. The vote passed.
- 4. The Session established a separate money market account to hold reserve accounts.
- 5. The Church received a bequest of \$10,000 plus some jewelry from Carolyn Respess. The Session acted to place the funds and proceeds from the sale of the jewelry into the Angel Fund of the Capital Gifts list of funds.
- 6. Jean Snedegar reported that our on-line giving option is being set up through the Presbyterian Foundation and should be ready to go in September. More information is coming soon.
- 7. Rally Day was scheduled for September 8th along with the Annual Church Picnic. Sunday School for all ages will resume on September 8th.
- 8. Steve Cook, reporting for Witness Service, relayed that there were 62 people served at Common Ground Café on July 20th. The next Common Ground Café is scheduled for November 9th.

PRESBYTERY OF WEST VIRGINIA...

It was a pleasure to serve as DMPC's Ruling Elder Commissioner at the August 24th meeting of the Presbytery of West Virginia, particularly since it was held at Bluestone Camp and Retreat Center! Each time I visit, I am reminded of what a treasure we have right here in our presbytery. If you haven't been there, I highly recommend you carve out an opportunity. You'll find it very nurturing for your spirit! Whatever we can do to support this sacred space, especially combined with our own personal retreat and renewal, will be worthwhile. Some highlights of the meeting include:

Education segment featuring Jessica Lilly, host and co-producer of *Inside Appalachia*. She spoke about her life and career as a journalist in Appalachia and some of the stories she has covered.

Worship was reminiscent of old time and camp songs sung *a cappella*, with Rev. Stephen Baldwin preaching a powerful sermon about living and serving between faith and fear.

Megan White, who serves as moderator of the D&E Chapel, accompanied us to the meeting. The Presbytery Leadership Team has recognized the importance of the only 1001 New Worshipping Community in our presbytery having a formal place in the structure, and Megan made the first official report from the student leadership to the Presbytery. It was a proud moment to witness!

We successfully examined Maggie Rust, a candidate from East Tennessee Presbytery seeking ordination to serve the First Presbyterian Church of Bluefield as a minister of Word and Sacrament.

Rev. Dawn Adamy was introduced as the new pastor of Bream Memorial in Charleston. We approved the Presbytery's 2020 budget. It includes a larger (and most would say unsustainable in the long run) draw on investments. Some adjustments have been made to reduce some programmatic expenses, along with the acknowledgement that as staff retirements become a reality, attrition will likely result in a smaller staff.

New committee members and chairs were elected.

Anyone who might be interested in serving as a Ruling Elder Commissioner to the General Assembly in Baltimore next summer is encouraged to apply for consideration.

Approved the dissolution of four churches: Pickens, Lakeview, Richwood, and Westminster

in Charleston.

THE LITTLE MARKET...

The Little Market at Tygarts Valley Middle/High School was started last year to meet the hygiene and dietary needs of the students in the school. The school does participate in the successful backpack program run by Otterbein Methodist Church, but the faculty found that there were needs that extended beyond the scope of that program. The Little Market is designed to fill that gap, based on the freedom to choose. Students can shop before lunch, after lunch or at the end of the day. The only restriction is that whatever they take goes into their locker and home with them that day. They are not allowed to eat the food in school. We encourage them to take what they want but to use what they take.

Before we started the market we only had the backpack program. Food was dropped off at a table by the front door and left there. Students were free to take the bags of food home if they wanted. This caused a problem. The bags of food were torn into and all the best treats were taken out. Only the healthy food was left. Students that needed the food weren't taking it because it was embarrassing. Students that didn't need the food were eating it for lunch or for snacks during the day.

We realized that we needed to re-imagine what food distribution could look like. Basing our model on a food bank in Akron, Ohio called "The Landing" we set out on our mission to give students who need food dignity and choice. We painted, re-branded, and opened our doors to all the students. We did tours at lunch time to show the students the new facility. We recruited student helpers to stock the shelves and make phone calls. Those in need "self identified" and were placed on the "Preferred Shoppers" list. The faculty pooled resources and were able to fill the shelves of The Little Market with hygiene products that were collected through various programs. We had tooth paste, tooth brushes, deodorant, lotion, shampoo, conditioner, soap, towels and body wash. Some of these products had been in the school for some time, never finding their way into the hands of the students. When placed in The Little Market, they flew off the shelves. Kids were even sent down midday to grab deodorant. They were so happy to have a choice in products and would even bring their friends in later to grab some deodorant of their own. Products like can openers and spoons that were donated to the school were put on the shelves. Students were so pleased. These went home to be presents to moms and to replace broken utensils. Students were able to choose their own shopping bags to fill with whatever they wanted. Our list of preferred shoppers bloomed to over 40 students. Daily shoppers at the market held strong and we served about 5-10 students per day. We now have the support of the student body. They think it is cool.

The Witness Service committee is helping with some of our needs by making funds available for purchasing needed items, but we would like to ask the congregation to donate regular size (not travel or sample size) hygiene products, non-perishable food items, and small household items that will fit into the shopping bags. A shopping basket will be in the White Chapel for you to leave your items in. We will also gladly accept monetary donations.
