Dear Flock,

It's now Advent when we begin to think of the coming of Jesus the Christ in the manger, as well as, Jesus the Christ the one who returns. Both appearances in scripture are in front of us in every Advent season. And the reason is that the coming of Jesus goes right to the heart of who God is. Advent is the season of waiting for the God who comes.

Dr. Eugene Peterson says it best. "God isn't an immovable object at the center of the universe. He's not a fixed point on an astronomer's map. He's active and moving – he *comes*. And this movement has direction – he comes to *US*. He doesn't wander around window shopping from galaxy to galaxy, juggling the moons of Jupiter and casually admiring the rings of Saturn. *We are his destination*. And he didn't simply come once and then return to spend the rest of eternity ... telling stories of his trip and boring the angels with slides of his visit to earth. He came, and he will come *again*. The Christian life, consequently, is lived between those two comings."

The message of the Bible is that God loved us so much that he came to us in the Old Testament and in the New, in Jesus Christ the Word of God. The message of the Bible is also that there are helpful and not so helpful ways to live together as the ones who wait for his coming. Listen during this season of Advent for clues, tips and truth about what it means to be mindful and faithful waiters for the God who comes, and comes again.

The Church staff joins me is offering you our warmest blessings for a deeply meaningful Advent and Christmas Season. We look forward to waiting and welcoming by your side.

Session Notes from the November 11th stated meeting of the Session of DMPC:

Among the actions taken at our most recent Session meeting were for the following:

- 1. Took a second vote on removing \$13,087.92 from the Angel Fund and return it to various Capital Gift Funds. This amount represents previously approved and withdrawn funds that were never used for the purpose of their withdrawal.
- 2. Took a second vote on taking up to \$45,000 from the Angel Fund to establish a money market account to hold various reserve accounts that had been spent on our deficit budget. This new account would be for the purpose of holding these reserve funds separate from the regular checking account of the church.
- 3. Took a first vote on a request from the property committee for \$2,820 from the Property One fund to provide maintenance on the flat room over the back section of the church building.
- 4. Heard from Treasurer Larry Wing of his plans to retire from the position of Church Treasurer in the coming months and discussion possible options for his replacement. This would potential include paying someone to do the job.
- 5. Approved Dr. Steven Tuell to preach at DMPC November 24th (actual date December 1st)
- 6. Approved a recommendation of the Christian Education Committee that a Christian Education Coordinator be hired and the money to pay for salary be placed in the budget.
- 7. Had a first reading of a proposed 2020 budget prepared by the Finance Committee
- 8. Approved the Nominating Committee's recommendation that the class of new Elders 2022 include Sue Chenoweth, Gary Moden, Lynn Proudfoot and Bob McCutcheon.
- 9. Set the election of the new elders for December 8th and the Installation of the new elders for December 29th.
- 10. Approved Peter Vial's request for study leave for January 28 February 2 to attend the annual meeting of Presbyterian Christian Educators.
- 11. Approved the recommendation that Executive Presbyter Ed Thompson preach and administer communion on February 2nd in Vial's absence.
- 12. Heard from the Fellowship Committee that they are aiming to have after church coffees twice per month. The committee will be asking for cookies and other baked goods for the receptions to follow the Lessons and Carols Service on December 5th and the Christmas Eve service.
- 13. Heard from the Witness Service Committee that they served 88 persons at the November 9th Common Ground Café.
- 14. The Holy Trinity Lutheran Women's Bazaar will be held Saturday, December 7th.

Who's in my Pew? Julia and Harold Elbon

Their faith has always been an anchor in their lives. Harold was active in the Elkins First Baptist Church and the youth group. Both Elbons have served on Session and Julia on Capital Gifts. Julia was the pianist at the former Westminster Church in Pocahontas County where her grandmothers were founding members. She recalls the area church youth exchange visits in the fifties. Davis Memorial Presbyterian Church delivered its youth to camp and events in a van called "The Chariot." When it arrived at church camp (ShawMiDeleca) on the Greenbrier River near Lewisburg, years before Bluestone, the kids rolled out of the van like a swarm of bees.

Harold and Julia celebrate thirty-eight years of marriage. Harold is the step-father to Ashley Pitsenberger Harper of Seneca Rocks and James Julian Pitsenberger of Belgrade, Montana. Two grandchildren-- Cali Ann and Cole Matthew Harper bless their lives.

Realtor, Educator, West Virginia Legislator, and County Commissioner have been Julia's life works. She founded Archer Real Estate, which served the area for 30 years. Recently, she penned a trilogy of Lil' Leroi (a trilogy of values). These children's books speak through the train that started the Durbin Rocket Ride. As an educator, Julia encouraged students to reach their potential. Julia holds a Masters in Counseling from West Virginia University. She served 30 years on the West Virginia Housing Authority Board and was elected National President of the state agencies. Julia enjoys the challenge of creative activities, which shows in their hotel décor – the Ekins Inn and Suites in the Randolph Center and the Iron Road Inn.

Harold, like his father, has a life-time in construction. His career included Assistant Chief of Planning and Development of West Virginia Department of Natural Resources, where they designed and built projects. In private construction, he joined with Trushel Construction, which built statewide facilities, including the fish hatchery at Reeds Creek, the local Senior Center, the court house annex, and our airport's Phares building as well as renovating Halliehurst and Graceland, projects spanning fifty years. His company built the handicap ramp at our church as well as the Elkins Railyard Town Square and the Railyard Restaurant. Harold studied engineering at Davis and Elkins in the 60's and likes to design facilities. Also, for 18 years, he served as an Elkins City Councilman.

Together, the Elbons devote time and energy to local tourism, serving on the WV Railroad Museum Board, the Durbin and Greenbrier Valley Railroad Board, and the Board of the Elkins Depot Welcome Center CVB.

CHURCH COUNCIL: A total of \$425 was donated to the ELCA Disaster Relief fund. Nancy Goerlich transferred her membership to St. Paul Lutheran Church in Morgantown. She was a member of Holy Trinity for 36 years and will be missed.

The first half of our congregational meeting was held on November 10 with 13 voting members present. The 2020 budget for the general fund will be \$45,000 and the budget for the property fund will be \$50,000. Jane Hazer resigned her seat on church council. Patty Calain, Brenda Ramsey and Greg Schumacher were elected to serve the next three years.


