Three churches in the Presbytery of West Virginia have joined together in Christian faith for a prayer vigil to be held Nov. 1-3. We invite you to join with us in prayer as we pray for peace, healing, and reconciliation for our churches, our communities, our state, and our nation. To participate, you are asked to join in a time of individual prayer on each of these three days at 8 a.m., noon, and 4 p.m. following these prayer themes:

Nov. 1 – health & healing from the global pandemic, lamenting with those who have lost or are separated from loved ones

Nov. 2 – essential workers and those who have lost jobs, income, shelter and/or a way of life Nov. 3 – God's healing grace for our communities, our state, and our nation.

WE BUILD ON GOD'S FOUNDATION ...

It has been a long time since March 15th when we last worshiped together in the church sanctuary. Many of us have had to make changes in our lives dealing with our families, work, and living what would be our normal lives. We have a difficult time wondering when our lives will return to normal. A friend of ours from Minnesota sent us an email last week with a story that is quite relevant to today's world. A micro version is this: a farmer was asked to give blessing at a church super. In it he said: You may hate buttermilk, you may hate lard, and you don't particularly like white flour, but if you mix them together and bake them, the results are warm, fresh biscuits. The story ended with this prayer:

"Lord, when things come up that we don't like, when life gets hard, when we don't understand what you are saying to us, help us to just relax and wait until you are done mixing. It will probably be even better than biscuits. Amen."

Within that prayer we see great wisdom for the many things that are occurring in the world today. Our church has continued to move forward and serve its community. We may not all worship together, but we continue to worship together on the radio or on Facebook each Sunday. The session continues to do its work and meet online on a monthly basis, our committees continue to do their work. We have experienced Zoom communion together and Zoom Coffee Hours. Circle groups are social distancing and meeting in the Fellowship Hall of the church.

In 1 Corinthians 3: 9-11:

We are God's co-workers... God's building. According to the grace of God given to me, like a wise master builder, I laid a foundation and another is building upon it.

FAMILY ADVENT WREATH CANDLE LIGHTING DEVOTIONS

You will need an Advent wreath with real or artificial pine, three purple candles, one pink candle, and one white candle in the center, and matches.

First Sunday in Advent – Hope Scripture: Isaiah 9:2; 6-7

Isaiah foretold that the Savior, the Messiah, the King of the Jews would be born of a young woman in the town of Bethlehem. For many centuries God's people had hope this Messiah would come. Soon it would happen! Light one purple candle.

Prayer – Dear God: When You were ready and the time was right – You promised to send a Savior, the Messiah. Help us, this Advent season to prepare the way for Him to be born in our hearts and enter our lives. Amen.

Second Sunday of Advent –Love Scripture: Luke 1:26-38

God chose Mary to bear God's Son. Mary obeyed because she loved God. God was able to save the world through Jesus.

Light two purple candles.

Prayer - Dear God, thank You sending for Jesus and for choosing Mary to be His mother. Help us to feel Jesus' love in our hearts this Advent and Christmas season. Amen.

Third Sunday of Advent – Joy Scripture: Luke 2:1-4

Mary and Joseph left their home in Nazareth and traveled to Bethlehem because of the census. It was a hard journey as Mary was expecting her first child. We light the rose candle in Joy as Jesus' birth is drawing near.

Light two purple candles and the pink candle.

Prayer - Dear God: Joseph and Mary trusted You even when they did not understand. Help us to obey You in all we say and do – then we will know Your joy. Amen.

Fourth Sunday of Advent – Peace Scripture: Luke 2:6

Mary and Joseph found no room to stay in Bethlehem – all the inns were full of travelers. But they found a place in a dark, cold stable with a manger where food was placed for the animals. There Mary found peace as she awaited the birth of her Son.

Light three purple candles and the pink one.

Prayer – Dear God: Like Mary and Joseph, we are at peace – the long awaited Messiah will soon be here. Amen.

Christmas Eve

Scripture: Luke 2:7

Advent is over! Tonight we celebrate the birth of Jesus, God's Son. Mary placed her precious Baby in the manger. Help us rejoice in this birth and promise to follow this Child as He leads us to do Your will. Amen.

Light all the candles.

Prayer: Dear God: Tonight we offer thanks for the gift of Your Son. May our hearts be ready to receive Jesus and may we welcome others in His name. Amen.



HOLY TRINITY LUTHERAN CHURCH NEWS CORNER...

Church council met on October 19. Due to the large number of Covid 19 cases in the county, it was decided NOT to reopen our doors yet. We will continue to listen to the DMPC service on the radio (WDNE) or watch it on DMPC Facebook. We will not have a Christmas Eve service this year.
