SESSION NOTES FROM SESSION, MARCH 14, 2022...

The following happened at the March 14th Session meeting:

- *Sue Chenoweth offered a devotional on Prayer Walking.
- *Lynn Proudfoot was elected as Temporary Clerk for the meeting.
- *Cliff Marstiller presented the second vote on a \$30K budgeted withdrawal from the Angel Fund. It passed 10-0 in favor.
- *Session voted to sell 32 shares of Comcast stock which amounted to about \$45.
- *Session voted on a Proxy item from Citizens Bank regarding the make up of the Board of Directors of the Bank. 435 shares of the Bank stock is in the name of the Trustees of the Church (the Session).
- *Peter led the Session in a visioning discussion about the future ministry of the church. Results of the discussion will be available to the congregation.
- *Lynn Proudfoot presented the Worship Committee report Communion will next be celebrated on April 3rd and on Easter Sunday. Holy Week services will be held at noon each day at Woodford UMC with luncheon to follow.
- *Julia Elbon presented the financial statement for the month of February.
- *Sue Chenoweth presented the Christian Education report which included an invitation from First Presbyterian Church of Clarksburg for our confirmation aged kids to attend a one day confirmation class. (For churches with only a few kids)
- *Lynn Proudfoot provided a report from the February 19th meeting of the Presbytery of West Virginia.

WHAT IS HOLY WEEK?

The week preceding Easter is known as Holy Week. It begins on Palm Sunday and is traditionally a week of somber reflection on the events preceding Jesus' death: his triumphant entry into Jerusalem; his betrayal by Judas; his Last Supper with his twelve apostles; his arrest, crucifixion and death; and his burial in a tomb.

WHAT IS PALM SUNDAY?

On Palm Sunday, Christians celebrate Jesus' procession into Jerusalem, which occurred several days before his death. According to the gospels, the people of Jerusalem spread branches from trees—identified specifically as palm branches in John's gospel—on the road to welcome Jesus as he rode a donkey into the city. Because of this, many Christian churches today offer congregants palm fronds as they enter the church on Palm Sunday. In some denominations, the story of Jesus' entry into Jerusalem and of his death is read in church on Palm Sunday, juxtaposing the welcome Jesus received on one day with his betrayal and arrest a few days later.

WHAT IS HOLY THURSDAY?

On Holy Thursday (also called Maundy Thursday), Christians commemorate the Last Supper—a Passover meal that Jesus shared with his disciples the night before his death. During the meal, Jesus broke bread and offered his followers wine, saying "This is my body, given up for you." Many Christians consider this event to have been the institution of the <u>Eucharist</u>, which is a sacrament in some denominations.

WHAT IS THE PASSION?

Though today the word "passion" has romantic connotations, it was originally derived from the Latin word *passio*, meaning suffering. In religious contexts, the Passion (often capitalized) refers to the torture, crucifixion, and death of Jesus.



- 2. Accept a bid from North Central Building Solutions to replace the entire roof at a maximum cost of \$31,800 with a five-year maintenance guarantee.

The Legend of the Dogwood

At the time of Crucifixion the dogwood had been the size of the oak and other forest trees. So firm and strong was the tree that it was chosen as the timber for the cross. To be used thus for such a cruel purpose greatly distressed the tree, and Jesus nailed upon it, sensed this.



In His gentle pity for all sorrow and suffering Jesus said to the tree: "Because of your regret and pity for My suffering, never again shall the dogwood tree grow large enough to be used as a cross. Henceforth it shall be slender and bent and twisted and its blossoms shall be in the form of a cross — two long and two short petals. And in the center of the outer edge of each petal there will be nail prints, brown with rust and stained with red, and in the center of the flower will be a crown of thorns, and all who see it will remember."


